Dear Mr. Hayes:

In reference to your letter of August 16th, thank you for the information you sent. We will keep it on file.

I was not able to find information about death date and burial place of James Everingham of Willoughby. My searches did turn up the Will of a James Everingham, Farmer, of Crowland Township, who died 13 April, 1886. His wife was Anna, and his children: Charlotte Darby, Annie Doan, Elizabeth Yokom, Ellen Wylie, Clark (predeceased his father) and John Everingham. (Welland Co. Will #1199) Various listings of cemeteries in Willoughby are contained on four reels of microfilm here. It would take more time than we have available to search them all. I did check the Willoughby cemetery listings in the W.G. Reive Genealogical/Cemetery notes with no success.

I also turned up another Will (Welland Co. Will #654) of James A. Everingham, Welland Village, Miller. He died May 13, 1875. His wife (as near as I can make out on a very mould-damaged document) was Eleanor Frances. His children are not named, but there is a letter from his sister, Mrs. Joanna Mosher, of Gagetown, Michigan, asking who is the administrator of his estate.

None of the lists of 3rd Lincoln Militia we have lists Jacob Everingham. However, the returns of Capt. Samuel Street's Company of 3rd Lincoln Militia list William, James and Andrew Everingham as Privates in 1822 and 1824. (Ms 193, H-VI-1,p.37 ff.)
